Alice provided an amazing tour full of laughs and interesting facts.

During this time attendees were arriving at the hotel and collecting their convention package which was presented in a black tote with a white cowboy boot and willow pattern on the front.

This was followed by Show & Tell, during which time Sandra and Terry Leonard were presented with 30th convention plates featuring willow and a tractor to cover both their interests as they are the only members who have attended all 30 conventions. They were also made lifetime members of IWC! We even had an amazing cake made by the hotel to celebrate our anniversary milestone.

Friday, July 10th, started with Hugh Sykes' presentation which was themed on Pagodaville, home to the South













West Texas Willow Collectors. This group, along with the South West Texas Yorkshire Relish Appreciation Society, shared information and pictures of their collections. Of particular interest was the discovery of a

Connie Rogers presented a lecture titled "Beyond the Basics" which explored Willow and its ancestors and how early English manufacturers had either adopted a pattern with a "Chinese Ancestory" or one with an "English Ancestory." The presentation provided an interesting and informative discussion on how variations of the willow pattern could be interpreted as to where the ancestory of the pattern originated. Connie provided numerous examples of how the Chinese pattern had over the years been copied by English engravers either incorrectly or embellished with additional features.

The theme for the table setting competition was Willow and Western movies. The place setting was won by Brenda Hoffer, second was Michael

> Curtner, and third was Dave Boering. Brenda's table setting featured a western movie theme.

There were nine entries in the art competition which ranged from embroidered pictures, quilting and decoupage shoes. The winner was Kathy Sykes with her Willow shoes and bracelet, second was Zeta Hollingsworth's framed, embroidered picture and third was Michael Curtner with a quilted piece of Willow. (cont'd)
